Roberts Rules of Order

A Basic Primer

The Voters Meeting will be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order, as described in this summary.

CALL TO ORDER

This occurs at the beginning of the meeting, once quorum has been attained. A quorum for a Voters Assembly at St. John's is 35 members.

MOTIONS

Decisions are made at meetings by voting on propositions put forward by members. Such propositions are called *motions*. Any person who is eligible to vote at a meeting may make a motion. This is how to make a motion and what happens next:

- In order to be recognized by the Chair, raise your hand.
- When recognized by the Chair, speak your motion in a clear and concise manner. (Do not give a speech or explanation first. That comes later.)
- Use this form: "I move that we "
- The Chair will ask for a *second*. If there is a second, the matter proceeds. If there is not a second, the motion dies.
- If there is a second, the Chair will ask for *discussion*.
 - As the person who made the motion, you may speak first.
 - The Chair will recognize others who wish to speak. Members must raise their hands.
 - As the mover, you may not speak again until all others have had a chance to speak.
- When discussion has completed, the Chair will ask for a *vote*.

AMENDMENTS

It is possible to suggest a change to the motion that is being discussed. This is done by making a motion to *amend* the motion under discussion.

- Follow the same procedure outlined above for making a motion.
- If the mover and seconder of the original motion consent to the amendment, the amendment is deemed "friendly" and it does not require a second and is not subject to debate.

- If an amendment is not deemed friendly, it does require a second.
- The motion to amend is then debated and voted on upon before the debate resumes on the original motion.

MOTION TO CALL THE QUESTION

This is a motion to cease discussion and proceed to the vote on the motion under consideration.

- This motion is made as described above: "I move to call the question."
- The motion requires a seconder.
- This motion is not debatable.
- The motion must pass by a two-thirds vote to cease debate.

VOTING

Voting on motions normally requires a simple majority. Voting is normally done by a show of hands, however, anyone eligible to vote has the right to demand a vote by ballot. Voting by secret ballot normally occurs only when an election to fill a position is required, and the assembly does not desire to conduct the election by a show of hands.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- **Raise your hand if you wish to speak.** The Chair will take note and ask you to speak at the appropriate time.
- Only speak to the topic or motion at hand only. The Chair will guide the meeting to stick to the agenda as closely as possible, and to keep discussion to the matter at hand.
- If you wish to make a suggestion regarding the motion on the floor, form it in terms of an amendment. Your amendment will need seconding, after which it will become the current item on the floor.
- Try not to repeat points other people have already made unless you have something new to add to the point.

MOTION TO ADJOURN

A motion to end the meeting; requires a second and is not debatable.
