But Christians should know better. It's about Jesus.

And since it's about Jesus, our celebration of Christmas should be about Jesus. It should focus on Him. It should reflect His heart. It should work toward His purposes. It should honor His values. It should overflow with His love.

Because that's what Christmas is: It's about Jesus giving of Himself completely and totally for the undeserving and needy. It's about God in Christ walking across the universe into this broken world. God's heart, overflowing with love for broken people like you and me, entered this world as a helpless, vulnerable infant, so He could taste our tears, feel our burdens, cringe with our pain, and ultimately bear our guilt and die our death. It's all about Jesus.

Advent is a time of preparing our hearts and our lives to celebrate the birth of our Savior. But the way our culture observes this time of year presents significant distractions and obstacles. We almost have to be subversive to keep Christ in the center of Christmas. It's like we're conspiring against the cultural distractions.

That's what Advent Conspiracy is all about: Focusing on Christ throughout Advent. Seeking to celebrate His birth by emulating the way He lives. Seeking to celebrate the incarnation by being incarnations of life and mercy in the lives of others.

Join the conspiracy.

And have a truly blessed Advent.

Advent Conspiracy

Our Sunday Advent Series this year will focus on the four themes of our Advent Conspiracy Emphasis as we anticipate celebrating the birth of the Savior.

- **December 1 - [Worship Fully]** - Keep Jesus at the front and center of your Christmas celebration. Why not put times for worship first on the calendar, along with times for personal and family devotions?
- **December 8 - [Spend Less]** – We don't have to spend a lot to communicate love, and spending money we don't have certainly does not honor Christ. Why not spend less and say no to the rampant materialism of the secular aspects of the holiday?
- **December 15 - [Give More]** - The most meaningful gifts are those of time – time spent making something unique, time spent with people we love. Why not give truly valuable gifts – your time and yourself? Give relationally – like Jesus did.
- **December 22 - [Love All]** - It would certainly honor the meaning of Christmas to give to help those most in need. Why not take some of the money saved by [Spend Less] and donate it to where it is most needed?

Service of Health and Healing:

This service will focus on the power of God's Word to bring healing in the midst of physical ailments, strained relationships, and other difficulties and challenges in life. An extended period of time for community and personal prayers will be a part of the service, as well as anointing with oil.

Wednesday, December 18 (7:00)

Service of Lessons and Carols: This service, led by our Sanctuary Choir, consists of alternating scripture readings, and hymns and anthems, sung by both the choir and the congregation. The readings and carol texts follow highlight the anticipation and coming of the Messiah.

Habitat for Humanity Mission Trip

Kaua'i Habitat for Humanity

On Kaua'i, 41% of households are living in what are considered unaffordable housing situations. Habitat for Humanity has completed the infrastructure of the 'Ele'ele Iluna Subdivision Project with the goal to build 107 new affordable homes. They have also purchased additional land which will be ready for future builds in 2020.

Type of Work

This Travel & Build trip will include various stages of new home construction for a group of homes in Phase 2, Increment B of the 'Ele'ele Iluna Subdivision. Depending on the current stage of construction, the activities may include: foundation, framing, painting, installing fixtures, siding, roofing, installing cabinets, finish work. We will have a more concrete idea of the tasks at hand when we are about 2 weeks out from our departure date.

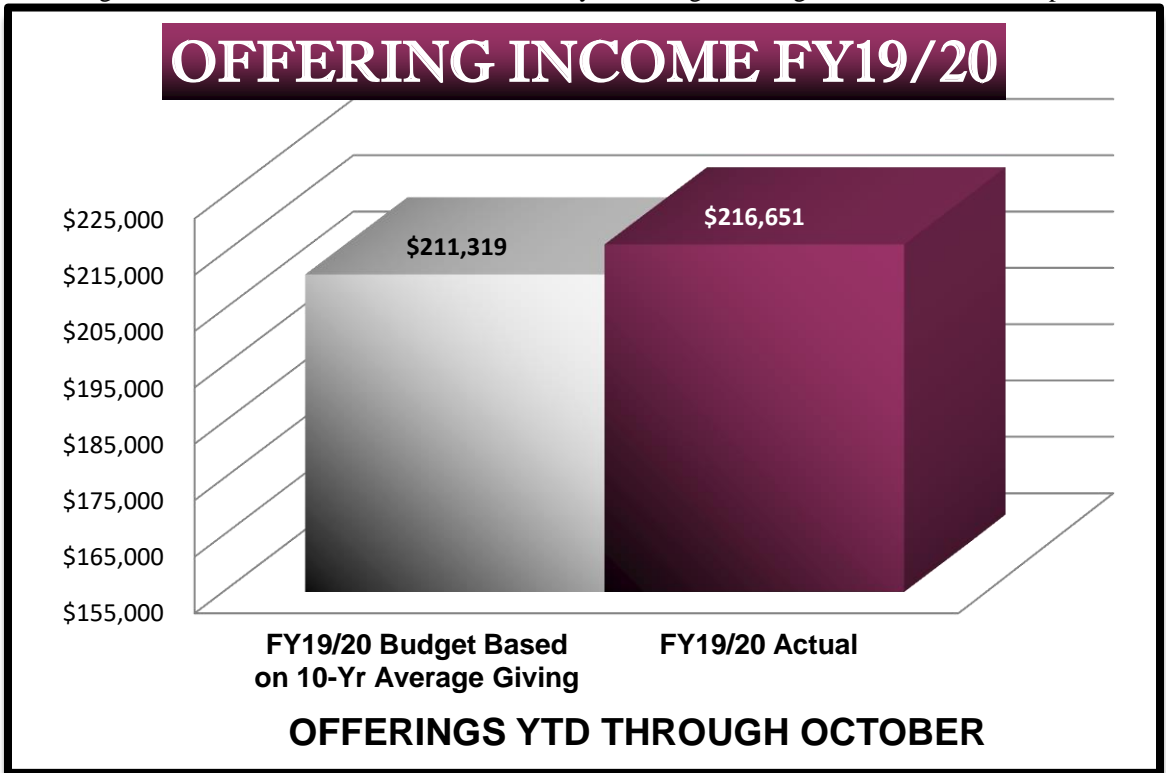

Stewards of the Christmas Gospel

As Christians, we are all stewards of the Gospel. We are to be messengers of God’s Good News that Christ was born to save.

Sometimes it's difficult to share this news. We don't want to put anyone off; the "perfect" opportunities don't come along; we don't know what to say. There is perfect opportunity, however. God has given us exactly the right words, and rarely does the Christmas story put anyone off.

Let's not waste our opportunity! What message does your Christmas card convey? Does it announce the birth of Jesus or wish your loved ones "Happy Holidays"? Does your Christmas letter mention how God has shed His grace on you and your family during the past year? God so loved the World that He gave His only Son. Personalize that message. Tell others how the birth of Christ has touched YOUR part of this world. Remind others that they are unique creatures whom Christ came to save. Tell them that they are among "*all the people*" to whom the angels brought "*good news of great joy*" (Luke 2:10). Tell them that Christ, the Baby in the manger, became a man Who died for their sins so that they can live eternally in heaven with Him. Invite them to church where God's Word is preached and sung and confessed and where His Sacraments are administered. Join the "*great company of the heavenly host*" and sing, "*Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom His favor rests*" (Luke 2:13-14).

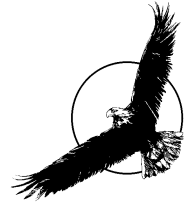

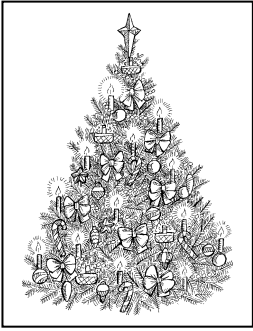

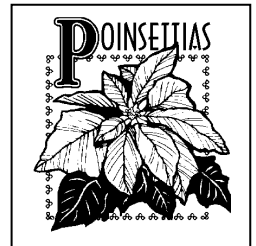

LCC K-9 COMFORT DOG MINISTRY UPDATE

“Walking Together / Serving as One”

To God be the Glory!

My team and I have done a lot of travelling this past month. Shortly after our regional team meeting in Las Vegas, the Kincade Fire broke out in Sonoma County. Micah Comfort Dog joined Reuben and myself as we visited first responders and firefighters at the Cal Fire base camp. Base camp is the temporary home for the firefighters who are battling the fires and provides them an opportunity for much needed rest. Micah, Reuben and I were very blessed to bring a bit of “normalcy” for these brave heroes while they were away from (and missing) their homes, families and pets.



Following the terrible shootings at Saugus High School, LCC Comfort Dogs were invited to Santa Clarita, CA by Bethlehem Lutheran Church, where we had visited several times before, to comfort those affected by this tragedy. Micah, Lois and I answered the call and we were joined by Ruthie, who came out from Lutheran Church Charities headquarters to meet us. In addition to spending time with students and staff, we also participated in a candlelight vigil to remember the victims. In the days following the incident, we continued to offer comfort, meeting with the community at several local parks. I am so grateful for the prayers and send-off by members of the church and St. John's Lutheran School prior to my deployment.

Last month Reuben and I joined the community of Paradise, CA as they commemorated the one-year anniversary of the terrible fires that swept through their town and surrounding communities. God remains faithful and these people are resilient and strong. Please pray for them as they continue to heal and rebuild.

When not deployed, I participated in several unique opportunities here at St. John's. In October, SJLS hosted a visit by Sgt. Ryan Guerra and the California Air National Guard Anti-Drug Task force team. They arrived in their Pave Hawk helicopter, landing on St. John's athletic field! I have ridden in cars and been aboard a boat, but I have never seen a helicopter up close before. I was fascinated to see it seemingly drop out of the sky when it landed and then disappear from view after take-off. They did not take me up for a ride, but they did invite me in for a tour of the helicopter. It was very cool!

Extraordinary Dogs was released last month, and I feel so humbled to have been included on the cover of this wonderful book. My first book “signing” was a lot of fun! Thank you to everyone for supporting the book and hanging out with me.

*(Spoken to the LCC K9 teams at the Saugus H.S. deployment...) “I’m not sure if you guys remember the gentleman that I connected with Saturday at Central Park. He was the man riding the Harley Motorcycle. His name is David. Anyway, he told me “something” compelled him to stop at the park and then to come say hello to me. He told me he lost his 15 yr. old daughter in 1994 in a high profile accident and the Saugus tragedy reminded him of that. He said after his daughter was killed he went down a very destructive road of drugs, self-inflicted wounds and that he hurt others. A lot of what he said was very “heavy” psychological stuff that I did not feel equipped for, so I just started talking about Jesus and let the Holy Spirit take over.

He initially said he did not feel worthy of God or coming back to the church. I told him that God loved him and that Jesus forgave him. We talked about Paul and how he did some very terrible things and how Jesus turned him into a magnificent light and disciple. I then introduced him to Pastor Joe and invited him to Bethlehem Lutheran Church. We prayed and exchanged emails. Then last night, back at the hotel, I opened my LCC devotion and it was about St. Paul! I forwarded the devotion to him. Well, he emailed me this evening and said he went to Bethlehem Lutheran Church today and met with Pastor Joe again, who introduced him to some people who he felt could help him and that he also felt good about going back to church. God is amazing!”

“Farmer Ted, how does your garden grow?”

It's been a long time since I've sat on Santa Claus' lap. I'm sure he wouldn't want me to do that today! I've become a big boy in more ways than one. But if I were invited to do so, and he would ask me, “Teddy, what would you like me to bring you for Christmas?” I know exactly what I would ask for. I would like him to bring me some new recruits for the Mission Farm Crew!

What's required of members of the Mission Farm Crew?

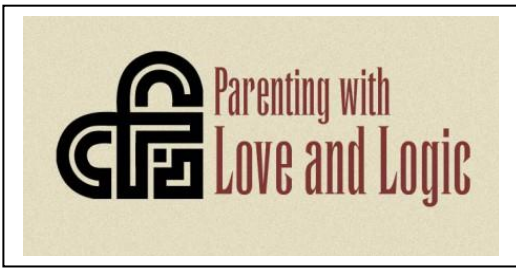
- Availability on any of the work days: Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday mornings, from 8:30 a.m. 'til 11:30 a.m. (You don't have to stay the entire time.)
- A reasonable degree of flexibility and balance.
- Work clothes, wide brimmed hat, work gloves.
- A sunny disposition (even on rainy days).
- A desire to serve economically challenged families in Jesus' name.

What's not required?

- Tools (we provide those).
- Garden or farm experience (helpful, but we will train).
- Being there each and every work day (we all have lives to live). If we send out a notice that we need many helping hands for a particular project, do make an effort to respond if possible.

Weather can be an issue during the winter months. However, we try to get as much work in as weather permits. We do have winter crops in the ground.

The total poundage of produce turned over to the Food Bank in October was 689.5, for a total for 2019 of 11,410 lbs.! Now can you see why we need Santa Claus to come through for us with some additional planters and pickers and preparers of produce (oh, and weeding too)?!



Beginning January 10th, we will be offering a parenting class called “Early Childhood Parenting Made Fun: Creating Happy Families and Responsible Kids” This is a video/discussion type class for parents of young children.

“When parents start Love & Logic in their children’s early lives, they dramatically up the odds that the teenage years will be fun instead of frantic. Parents will learn a practical set of tools to help raise super kids!”

Some of the topics covered are:

- Whining and arguing
 - Misbehavior in public
 - Smooth mornings and bedtimes
 - Calm sibling bickering and battling
 - Calm mealtimes, tooth brushing, bathing etc.

Disability Ministry: Feeling Comfortable With People Who Have Disabilities

Do you recall the biblical character Mephibosheth? Probably not. Not even many preachers know much about him, or at least seldom refer to him. Even fewer can pronounce his name without sounding as if they have a serious lisp. You can read about him in 2 Samuel 9:1-13.

Why do I ask? We can learn something about ministry to people with disabilities by what King David chose to do for Mephibosheth. Mephibosheth was the son of Jonathan and the grandson of King Saul. Saul and Jonathan were killed in the battle of Gilboa (1 Sam. 31). David mourned the death of Jonathan (a good friend of his) and King Saul (even though Saul had sought to kill David—he was still the Lord’s anointed). David inquires whether there is anyone of the house of Saul to whom he could show kindness for Jonathan’s sake. He is told about Mephibosheth, the son of Jonathan. He was crippled in both feet. David did two things for Mephibosheth—he restored certain lands owned by Saul so that Mephibosheth’s sons could farm and make a living, and he arranged that Mephibosheth should enjoy honor and hospitality at King David’s table each and every day. While others might look upon Mephibosheth and see only a “cripple”, David saw in him the image of his friend Jonathan and the dignity of his grandfather, the Lord’s Anointed.

We have been talking about St. John’s attempting to become an “irresistible church” (Joni Eareckson Tada’s term), a church that intentionally reaches out to people with disabilities, welcomes and involves them fully in the life, worship and ministry of the congregation. Such a church doesn’t look at people with disabilities as “cripples”, but they see in them what David saw in Mephibosheth—someone who bore the image of a beloved friend (Jonathan) and King of Israel (Saul). Thus David was moved to extend not only “hospitality”, but “royal treatment” to one that otherwise might have been seen only as an object of pity, or someone requiring public assistance.

People, no matter what challenges they face emotionally or physically, all bear the image of God in which they were created (Gen. 1:27). They are persons who have been redeemed by the precious blood of our Savior, and in whom he is pleased (or will be pleased) to dwell with his Spirit through Baptism (Acts 2:38-39). With that Spirit they are given not only the gift of faith, but gifts for service (Rom. 12:5-8). Thus they are not just people we have to do for. They are people gifted to do for others in the church and for the sake of the world. Let us begin by extending “hospitality” and “giving the royal treatment” to all. Soon enough the gifts resident in them will reveal themselves to us.

The Lutheran Hour Ministries Float Committee (LHMFC) is an all volunteer group of

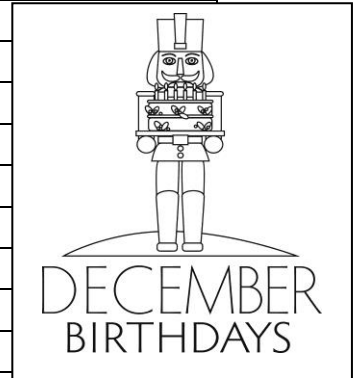

The **PetalPushers®** is a group of 4,000-5,000 volunteers from across the US and Canada, who decorate floats. These volunteers are organized and coordinated by the LHMFC. PetalPushers® volunteers will decorate the LHM float this year along with as many as nine additional floats. Phoenix Decorating, our float builder, makes a donation to LHMFC in proportion to the number of hours worked by the PetalPushers® volunteers. Petal Pushers work primarily starting December 26th until the float is completed on December 31st at the construction site in Irwindale, California.
