

All members of St. John's, who plan to attend any of our ten synodical universities or our two seminaries, are eligible to apply. All you have to do is send a brief note to St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church, ATTN: Tim Kramer, or an e-mail to

<u>tkramer@stjohnslutheran.net</u>, announcing your intent to enroll in the 2021-2022 academic year. All applications must include the following information:

- a) Your Name
- b) School Name
- c) Student ID or Account # (if returning student)
- d) Degree you are pursuing
- e) Year and Level of study (e.g. Junior year, Undergrad; 5th year, teacher certification, or student teaching; Graduate studies)
- f) Attending Fall Term or Spring Term (or both)
- g) Briefly explain why you're attending Concordia and how you plan to use your studies/future vocation to shine the light of Christ and to witness for Jesus as His kingdom representative in the world.

<u>Deadline for applications is March 31, 2021</u>. Actual grant amount to each student is undetermined but will be based, in part, upon the number of students requesting assistance. So, if you are considering attending a synodical university--<u>even if you have not made a final decision</u>-please send a brief note informing us of where you are in your decision process so that we can plan accordingly.



What Is Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Ministry is a national Christian ministry of trained men and women, called Stephen Ministers, who bring healing and love to hurting people. St. John's Lutheran Church joined this national ministry in 2018. It is an important way in which our congregation carries out its mission and moves us toward our vision. Stephen Ministers are caring Christians who listen, understand, accept, and pray for and with care receivers who are working through a crisis or a tough time. One-to-one care is provided during weekly meetings between the Stephen Minister and the person receiving care.

Stephen Ministers are caregivers. They have engaged in over 50 hours of training in Christian caregiving, including such topics as listening, emotions, boundaries, assertiveness, using Christian resources in caregiving, and specialized topics such as ministering to the divorced, hospitalized, bereaved, and aging. We are truly fortunate to have five active Stephen Ministers: Clare King, Jeff Mellow, Jason Newton, Linda Reed, and Roxana Wright. Our congregation is also very blessed to have seven people who are in the last 20 hours of their training: George Clark, CC Commander, John and Pam Foottit, Missy Loban, Sandra Mehrens, and Sal Pagano.

Care receivers are the recipients of Stephen Ministers' care. Anyone from our church, school, or community who is experiencing divorce, grief, loss of a job, loneliness, hospitalization, terminal illness, or any other life's difficulties would benefit from this ministry. We are all broken and in need of God's healing. Care receivers can feel safe expressing their needs, sharing their burdens, and then receiving confidential, Christian care from a Stephen Minister, whether it is during a crisis or just during a difficult time.

Stephen Leaders oversee and direct each congregation's Stephen Ministry. They recruit, select, train, organize, and supervise our Stephen Ministers, identify people in need of care, and match them with a Stephen Minister. Pastor Mark, Pam Barker, and Penni Cremen are the current Stephen Leaders at St. John's. Contact any of them if you know of someone who might benefit from having a Stephen Minister, if you are interested in becoming a Stephen Minister, or if you have any questions and want to learn more about Stephen Ministry.



"For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul?" (Matthew 16:26)(ESV)

The False Hope of Wealth

In Luke 19 we read the story of Zacchaeus, the tax collector, who was a wealthy man. Zacchaeus, knowing that Jesus was passing by, climbed the sycamore-fig tree in order to see Him. When Jesus reached the spot where Zacchaeus was, He said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." (v. 5) Out of joy and gratitude, Zacchaeus told Jesus that he would give half of his possessions to the poor and if he had cheated anyone he would give back four times the amount. Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham." (v. 9)

Zacchaeus was more than willing to give--he was eager to give. Having come to a knowledge of Who God is, he was excited about giving his earthly possessions for the glory of God.

Contrast Zacchaeus' reaction to that of the Rich Young Ruler (Luke 18:18-30) who asked Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus told him he must keep the commandments. Because Jesus knew the Rich Young Ruler's god was his riches, He added, "Sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come follow Me." (Luke 18:22) Unfortunately the Rich Young Ruler placed his love and security in his riches so he went away sadly.

Jesus did not demand that everyone become poor to be His disciple, but in this case, He knew that the young man, although he had tried to be a model of virtue according to the Jewish law, was actually an idolater in violation of the first commandment. His god was his wealth.

Jesus correctly gauged Zacchaeus' spiritual condition by his willingness to part with his money, and He also saw the hardness of the heart of the Rich Young Ruler who was unwilling to part with his money.

Often money is a barrier to our spiritual growth. Money can possess us. Jesus said again and again that there is no security in wealth. Our society identifies possessions with happiness and an adequate income with security. Do we possess our money or does our money possess us? Does our behavior suggest that we, like the young man, are idolaters of money? Do we place our hope in money? If we hold onto our earthly treasures with a tight grip, we need to question where our hearts are. If we look at our pocketbooks we will see where we have our priorities. Our giving is a true indication of our commitment to the Lord.

May God grant us all faithful and discerning hearts so that we will place our hearts and our hope in God alone.

Prayer: Lord, I thank You for the opportunity that I have to work and earn an income. Grant me wisdom to be a good manager of the money that You entrust to me. Help me develop a proper attitude toward it so that it doesn't become overly important and help me to see that money is a tool to help extend Your kingdom. In Christ's name I pray. Amen.



We started off the month celebrating World Cancer Day. Our students donated over \$1000 for the Queen of the Valley Cancer Wellness Program. This program offers a personalized exercise plan, nutritional and stress mastery counseling, and psycho-social and

spiritual support at no charge to all cancer patients who reside in the Napa Valley, regardless of where they are treated, and for all cancer patients treated at the Queen, regardless of where they live. This program is fully funded through generous community support.

A very successful parent workday was held on Saturday, February 6 in anticipation of our students returning to campus full time. Plexiglas was installed, social distancing markers were placed, and furniture was placed into storage. Students were greeted Monday morning by our Eagle and lots of fun and excitement was had seeing old friends and meeting new friends.

So, What's New at the Farm?

One might think that winter is a slow time on the Farm. Crops all safely in. Volunteers taking time off to take care of their own projects at home. Water shut off, and letting God take care of the irrigation. Letting Mr. Kubota cool his heels for a while in the shed after a long season of tilling, toting, and the like.



Well, think again! We have cool weather crops in the ground that need tending: carrots, onions, beets, and only recently did we finish harvesting the cabbages, broccoli, and cauliflower. Weeds grow all year around, and we are fighting the battle to keep them from swallowing up the onions, garlic, leeks, carrots, etc. We take the time to repair and repaint all the garden signs that identify what crops we have planted where. This is a service to some of our volunteers as well as to school and church members who come over to see what we are raising. We also take the time to clean, sharpen and repair all the various garden tools. Crop plans for next year are being made. A new fence line for tomatoes is being put into place. The fruit trees all received their annual "haircuts" (a real time consuming activity), just in time for them to dress up with their spring blooms. Seeds are being purchased, starter pepper and squash plants being planted under grow lights at Ron and Lois Johnson's property, and orders placed with nurseries for still other starter plants like tomatoes and onions. Soon enough Dick Lemin will be firing up Mr. Kubota to mow the cover crops and begin disking it into the soil as green manure. And you should soon see some improvements being made around the storage area.

So, no, things have continued to be quite busy around the Mission Farm. But all the farmers are looking forward to the next crop season, and pray that God will bless the harvest abundantly as He did this past year! Amen!


